Rector's Annual Report St. John's in the Mountains Episcopal Church Stowe, Vermont

January 28, 2024

The Rev. Dr. Richard R. Swanson, Rector

We, the people and clergy of St. John's in the Mountains, took a huge risk in 2023. Stepping into a new vision of our congregational life following the 2022 sabbatical season, we committed ourselves to deepening our relationship with God, each other, and the wider community. Deepening relationships requires the openness to change, willingness to explore the unknown, and take risks in being God's people in new ways. Deepening relationships also take time. We have begun to take small steps into God's dream for St. John's in the Mountains. Below are a few of the highlights.

In March, we welcomed Dr. Sara Huff to St. John's in the Mountains as Music Director. A small group of parishioners, Natalie Hubbs, Audrey Coty, Deb Clark, and Rich Reed joined Deacon Zarina and me in conversations with her, including the opportunity to listen to her play hymns and preludes/postludes. Since joining us, Sara has composed three pieces of music for our worship, including a setting of the Lord's Prayer. Sara was the driving force in our first community-wide celebration of Advent Lessons and Carols. Together with Natalie Hubbs, parishioner and guest choirmaster, Advent Lessons and Carols we celebrated the spiritual journey leading to Christ's incarnation. Stowe Community Church and Blessed Sacrament Roman Catholic Church also participated in the service.

The Vestry initiated two new ventures: an art ministry and a wedding ministry. The Visual Arts leadership team of Deb Clark and Nat Kinney gave us a taste of how the church can come alive with visual art as music to the eyes. On June 27, we hosted our first Art Opening with the art by friends of the parish Maryellen Sullivan and Bob Fahey. On September 14, we began our second exhibit with the work of parishioner Gina Jenkins, and her friend Phyllis Rachel Larrabee titled *Pollage: A Collaboration Between Friends*. The 2024 Visual Art series continues with an opening of Peter Given's oil, acrylic, and watercolor paintings in early January.

Sandy Duncan, Mary Stiles and I initiated a new wedding ministry that Bishop Shannon MacVean-Brown has approved. We developed and published new wedding policies that allow clergy from protestant denominations to wed couples at St. John's in the Mountains. It is not traditional for clergy outside the Episcopal Church to lead services of Holy Matrimony in Episcopal church buildings, and therefore it was important to have the bishop's support of this ministry. Bishop MacVean-Brown was excited to see us stepping into a new expression of our ministry that reaches across new lines and builds new relationships. More to come in 2024 on our wedding ministry

The Audio-Visual ministry at St. John's in the Mountains is vibrant and expanding. Nearly 20% of our Sunday worshiping congregation joins online, either on Zoom or on YouTube Live. Parishioner Donald Clinton administers the AV ministry, enabling parishioners and friends to join us from home or from long distances every Sunday at 10:00 a.m. Thank you, Donald.

Our new Open Arms Childcare Ministry was underway by mid-September when we welcomed Lily Dunlop to serve as the lead childcare support, with parishioners Deb Clark, Cindy Rodman, and Aba Grace assisting her. Since her arrival, our ability to directly support families with children has given parents the peace of mind to participate in Sunday services with comfort. Thank you, Lily.

In Lent of 2023, I began a series of Short Courses, 3 or 4-week classes on a variety of topics, held online and in-person. In the season of Lent, I lead a course on the *Book of Common Prayer*, in June, we discussed the Gospel of Matthew and how it is used in worship, and in November, Co-Warden David Small and I co-lead a course on faith, food-insecurity, and faith-filled response to crisis, based on the Book *Take this Bread* by Sara Miles. All of the courses were well attended and more are planned for 2024.

Expanding worship opportunities is central to the life of any congregation. In 2023, we continued to deepen our relationships with God and each other on Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m., through a meal, and conversation on scripture and the spiritual life while celebrating Holy Eucharist. Between the first Sunday in June and Columbus Day/Indigenous Peoples Weekend, we held a spoken service of Holy Eucharist on Sundays at 8:00 a.m. Starting on the First Weekend of Advent, we initiated a 4:45 p.m. service on Saturday evening with a light snack and hot cocoa at 4:15 p.m. that will continue through March 16, 2024. All three services address the needs of our worshiping congregation and visitors.

These are just the highlights – there are so many more stories that paint the picture of 2023. The Vestry chose to increase my time and compensation to full-time status in 2023. In doing so, I have been able to dedicate my time more fully to our shared ministry. Thank you to the Vestry who made all this possible: Mary Stiles and David Small, Co-Wardens, Sandy Duncan, Roger Nichols, Andy Rodman, Nat Kinney, Deb Clark, and Treasurer Wendelyn Duquette for their leadership, vision, and support. Thank you to our staff: Heidi Dwyer, Parish Administrator, Dr. Sara Huff, Music Director, Kristin Wells, Sexton, Fritz Laport, Bookkeeper, Lily Dunlop, Open Arms Childcare support, and Donald Clinton, AV Minister. I thank you, every member, friend, and loved one of St. John's in the Mountains for expressing your faith in Jesus Christ through your hearts, hands, gifts, and prayers.

Deacon's Report

The Rev. Zarina Castro

This was a year of many changes for me. And for my relationship with you, my parish family.

Early in the year, I began to feel called to decrease my committee and Sunday service involvement at St. John's. I turned 69 last year, and following my full retirement from my litigation practice, was trying to discern what God was calling me to do in this phase of my life. I spoke with Rick about this, ran a proposal by the Bishop, and entered into a new letter of agreement with the bishop and the parish that has me serving on the first, third and fifth Sundays of each month and every other Wednesday at the evening family Eucharist, and relieved me of my work on committees of the parish.

I also began planning for a Sabbatical (my first in 25 years as a deacon!) for four months from August through November. My plans had been to do three things: attend my first CREDO; take a vacation with two friends to the Maritime provinces of Canada; and deepen my involvement with the Poor People's Campaign.

I did attend the CREDO retreat, and was greatly enriched by the experience. I was the only deacon. The week covered four areas of health – spiritual, emotional, physical and financial. The presenters in each of the areas were wonderful, and the individual sessions offered us, which I took full advantage of, were focused and insightful. I just wished I had been able to access this experience at the beginning of my ministry. I am grateful for the parish's support in making contributions to the Church Pension Fund on my account that enabled me to do this now.

My friends and I spent months on Zoom making plans for our vacation, my first in decades that was not visiting my mother. We planned an August sojourn in Canada. When the summer came round, however, the wildfires in Canada, including in Nova Scotia, were making the news. Then the news of the air pollution from the smoke came out. After deliberation, the three of us decided to postpone the trip. I was really disappointed, but did convince my two friends to each visit me in Vermont in the fall. Those visits were both great.

After the floods in July, I saw a blurb on Front Porch Forum about the need for foster families since some had lost their ability to continue fostering. I had thought of becoming a foster parent again over the past years, and this need rekindled that interest. I applied, and by mid-August had a foster child in my home. He is a nine-year-old boy. He loves my dog Bear, cat Dragon, and guineafowl Felix. He and my son Arec get along well. He is both delightful and challenging. I do feel that my gifts with challenging kids are well utilized with him in the house.

Because of that huge change to my family life, I have cut back some on my involvement with the Poor People's Campaign. I remain committed to its work, and will continue to help with the planning of events, and with communication to St. John's and the diocese of its activities.

I always try to go out into the world rejoicing in the power of the Spirit.

Reflections on 2023 A Vestry Report to the Parish

At the start of the year, the Vestry made the bold move to ask Fr. Rick to serve our Parish as a fulltime rector. Building on the energy and enthusiasm that Fr. Rick brought back from his Sabbatical, we identified specific areas for growth and spiritual development to work on throughout the year.

On the programming front, we launched a Visual and Performing Arts Ministry and a Wedding Ministry. If you look around the church today, you can see the current Art exhibit that launched on January 9th. We hope this is the first of many that we'll be hosting in 2024. (Please note: There is a detailed report from the Arts Ministry included elsewhere in the Annual Report.) While we did not host any weddings in 2023, we have begun taking steps to let the local community and others know that St. John's in the Mountains offers couples the opportunity to celebrate their marriage in a beautiful, intimate church setting. Weddings are not limited to members of SJITM and can be performed by our clergy or by ordained clergy from several other denominations here in Stowe and beyond. As weddings are often planned many months in advance, we expect that it may take a year or longer to see this ministry begin to bear fruit, but we look forward to welcoming newcomers and visitors into our church home.

With regards to spiritual growth, we supported Fr. Rick in the launch of his "Short Courses." These are time-limited, adult faith formation classes on a variety of topics throughout the year. In order to maximize their accessibility, these classes were offered both in-person and online and had solid attendance. The Vestry also championed an 8:00 AM Sunday summer service and a 4:45 PM Saturday evening service during the winter months. These new services are in-person only and differ from our standard 10:00 AM service or Wednesday evening service. For example, the summer service has no music, while the winter service features piano music that is easy to sing. It appears that these new service times are attracting visitors and Parishioners who would otherwise be unable to attend our typical Sunday morning or Wednesday evening gatherings. We are excited to see these services gain traction.

Food insecurity was another area of focus for the Vestry this year, and it took center stage during Lent when Co-Warden David Small challenged Parishioners to bring in a Green Bag full of donations each Sunday for the Lamoille Community Food Share. This work culminated in a fundraiser / Parish dinner that successfully raised the desired funds while also providing us with a fun fellowship opportunity. Our work with the Food Share has continued beyond Lent. Presently, we have a dedicated "Green Sunday" each month where Parishioners can bring a Green Bag for the Food Share and funds collected in the offering plate are automatically directed to the Rector's Discretionary Fund.

The final area of focus for the Vestry in 2023 was Stewardship and our initial Seasons of Giving Campaign. We will look to build on our success of this past year by continuing to grow our pledge base and expand the ways in which we think of Stewardship. (Please note: There is a detailed Seasons of Giving report included elsewhere in the Annual Report.)

2023 Treasures Report - St John's in the Mountains

January 16, 2024

I am pleased to report that we did very well with respect to the vestry-approved budget. Our expenses were about \$6,500 below our budget as was our income, resulting in a Net Operating Income that was almost exactly as budgeted. The church chose to invest in a full-time minister and other budget items that required \$92,000 in support from our operation investments. While we did utilize \$92,000 from the investments to support the budget, the positive performance of our investments reduced our overall loss to just less than\$49,000, over \$43,000 better than we budgeted.

Not only did we enjoy the support of a full-time minister, but we were also able to make some important investments in our Music Ministries. In 2023 we received on loan, a much-improved piano and hired a musical director both involving unbudgeted expenses. In spite of these additional expenses, our final Net Ordinary Income was only \$145 more than anticipated in the budget.

On the Income side while we were under our budget goal by \$7,700 it is worth noting that our core support from the congregation, Plate, Pledge, and Regular Support, was almost \$11,000 more than our budget and this year's pledges are stronger still with more households pledging their support. We hope to continue to build on this increased support from the congregation. Misc. Income and rental income budgets proved a bit optimistic, as one-time donations in 2023 were not as strong as in 2022 and the investments in wedding ministries will take time to get established.

December finds us almost complete in our movement of our investments to the Vermont Community Fund which provides several layers of investment oversite. We are also excited about the additional services that they offer, to assist us in growing our funds.

This year's budget is yet to be voted on by the vestry. They are considering several budgets that support either a full-time, a ³/₄ time, or a ¹/₂ time minister. All predict the need for continued support for our operations from our investments. There is approximately a \$20,000 difference between having a full vs a ³/₄ time minister and \$20,000 between a ³/₄ and ¹/₂ time minister. The vestry has provided documents to better explain the impact of less than full-time minister at St John's. Your thoughts on each of these options are encouraged as the Vestry makes its final decision on a budget for 2024.

2024 Seasons of Giving Report to the Vestry

Based on the previous year's timeline, The Seasons of Giving Campaign started the week of August 27th with Fr Rick's letter to the parish as well as an article in St John's Weekly from the Seasons of Giving Committee. The committee, comprised of Pete Johnson, Nat Kinney, Andy Rodman, David Small, and Barbara Cunningham (our publicist) decided to rename the campaign Seasons of Giving as we believe support for St John's ministries must be a year-long process. We started the 2024 program late and realized by the end of the campaign we must start the 2025 pledge year in January 2024 to raise sufficient funds for the parish's needs.

The campaign was grounded in thoughtful articles pertaining to generosity and the act of faithfully giving which were written by members of the committee and published in St John's Weekly. In addition, at the ten o'clock services parish members Roger Nicholls and Nat Kinney reflected on the importance of giving and why it is significant in their personal life. Furthermore, Mary Stiles and Fr Rick produced two videos where they conversed about Faith and Generosity.

Ingathering Sunday was November 12th. We will have a celebratory brunch after the ten o'clock service on January 21st.

The brunch will be prepared and hosted by Tim Heath-Swanson, Donald Clinton, Emily Heymann, and Oliver Kelley.

A goal to raise \$95,000 in pledges was set at the August 6th initial Seasons of Giving meeting. To date, we have received 35 pledges raising \$102,110. This is \$7,110 above our 2024 goal and \$11,326 above pledges received for 2023. In addition, we increased our pledging units from 31 to 35 for 2024.

The Seasons of Giving Ministry will be active year-round as we move into 2024 planning for 2025, continuing to focus on growing St John's new ministries focusing on art, music, weddings, and food.

Father Rick guides us as we work together. Roger Nicholls, Sue Nicholls, and Deb Clark continue to be members along and are thankful for new members Robert and Sharon Witbeck who served in Pastoral Care ways at their previous church before joining St. John's. Welcome Robert and Sharon! Deacon Zarina Castro stepped away from the team in her now limited retirement time at St. John's. Thank you for your many years of being present and guiding us Zarina!

Monthly Zoom team meetings provided time for confidential updates and prayer about parishioners and friends with follow up including phone calls; emails; cards of encouragement, sympathy, and healing; communion; and visits. Discussion of potential projects, parishioner food provision, elder transport, Newcomer Gatherings, Wednesday Zoom Lunch; Sanctuary Art Wall Projects; and Lay Eucharist Ministry keep us moving forward. Through these activities of faith, we strive to bring Christ's love and healing.

Prayers of The People offered during Sunday service and in St. John's Weekly are reviewed weekly by team members. These include prayers that are ongoing along with new prayers for parishioners, loved ones, and the world to keep our attention in a current and vibrant way that is inclusive, contemporary, evocative, and traditional. Sue and Roger assist in choosing formats. Sue continues to send cards.

Being together when possible by attending Sunday church services and meetings is a blessing to all of us. Thank you to all who transport, you have angel wings.

With the addition of the Art Rail on the sanctuary north wall, the first art installation was exhibited for Valentines Day. Deb Clark St. John's in the Mountains Pastoral Care Team Leader 2023

Dr. Sara Huff started as Music Director in March of 2023.

Here are some of the highlights of music at St. John's:

- Steinway XR grand piano loan this offered an amazing opportunity to play a range of music from classical to contemporary Christian on a historic instrument.
- Guest artists this included members of the congregation: Natalie Hubbs (piano), Jill Witten (piano), James Grace (piano/vocalist); and from outside the congregation: Janelle Holmes, soprano (from Montana), Hannah Normandeau, soprano, and Shannon Keith, soprano (from Massachusetts).
- Advent Lessons and Carols congregation members formed a choir for the event, with Natalie Hubbs directing, and sang two anthems from the classic *Carols for Choirs*. Dr. Huff played piano and organ for a total of eleven musical selections after each reading, plus a prelude & a postlude.
- Newly composed music: Dr. Huff composed new service music, including a *Gloria, Sanctus,* and *The Lord's Prayer*, after being inspired by the congregation's enthusiasm for new music!
- Fr. Rick and Dr. Huff participated in discussion and planning around service music and the various liturgical seasons, and came up with a plan for the 2024 year. They also discussed and made a plan to move back to using hymnals and the hymn board to decrease the need for printed music in the bulletin. Dr. Huff went through musical inserts that had been previously printed, created some new musical inserts, and organized them so the office is able to readily access them for the bulletins.
- Fr. Rick, Dr. Huff, and Donald (AV Team) discussed possible improvements to the sound system, and a plan is in the works to meet with AV Environments to facilitate some additional microphones and inputs. This is important if the church wishes to host guest artists/groups in the future.
- Music is being offered at the 4:45 p.m. service, with discussion around developing a repertoire of well-known hymns for singing during this service. There will be piano hymns during the offertory and communion.

2023 Building and Grounds

Report to the Vestry

Through the efforts of many, St. John's in the Mountains buildings and grounds were maintained and tended to. Below is a summary of some of the projects in 2023:

<u>Sanctuary</u> - Installation of a picture rail system for the display of art, replacement of felt pads under all the pews to facilitate moving the pews, painting of the mid-section of walls, and maintaining lighting fixtures.

<u>Undercroft</u> - Decluttering and rearrangement of space for various ministries.

<u>Parking Lot</u> - Quotes were evaluated for the repairs or replacement of the asphalt in the parking lot and the pricing was way over the amount allocated in the budget.

<u>Grounds</u> - Replace burned-out bulbs in parking lot lights, thinned out perennials, maintained garden beds, and removed ground wasps along the walkway.

<u>Miscellaneous</u> – Lots of projects were quietly undertaken and completed by parishioners. We're grateful for the many parishioners who shared their time and talent on the above projects.

Altar Guild 2023

The Seasons of the Church create a rhythm through which the Altar Guild moves. In the chronological year, we end the Christmas season with Epiphany, The colors change the Advent wreath the creche is retired for another year and the poinsettia are removed to the undercroft. The frontal and super frontal are put away until a funeral or Easter whichever comes first. The weekly activities, that Barbara Baraw, Eileen Kramer, Oliver Kelly, our newest member, and Kristen Wells move through, have their own rhythm. Sometimes it is filling the candles for both altars first. Sometimes it is setting the "stacks" – dressing the chalices. (In 2023 we returned to using the "common cup" after several years that began with wafer only during Covid, then wafer and individual cups- post-pandemic.) To dress the chalice we place the *purificator*-used to wipe the edge of the chalice after one receives the wine-the *paten* -small silver plate, the priest wafer, the *pall*-square stiff cover and

Corporal – linen on which to place the service and elements for consecration. Other times we fill one carafe with water the second with wine, and the bread box with the wafers to be consecrated. "How much to use" is a weekly question that is answered in consultation with the deacon or priest. It is dependent on how many we estimate will attend service and how much is consecrated in reserve. Each week the purificators and corporals are laundered and ironed; when needed and before Easter the *fair linens* and *credence table cover* are laundered and ironed. Several times a year brass and silver are polished with the help of Joyce Manning. This past fall we reintroduced Saturday evening Service – we again set two separate stacks.

To this rhythm is added the occasional baptism, wedding, funeral, or special service, without interruption. Occasionally, we have the privilege of working while Sarah is rehearsing. When a season changes, Easter, Pentecost, the season after Pentecost, Advent the super frontal is changed to the appropriate color.

Please consider joining our team, it is fun to work in teams, with lots of laughs, good conversation and sometimes humming and singing. If you are curious, join us as we clean the chancel after Sunday Service.
